The Meaning of Gaudete

The third Sunday in Advent is traditionally known as *Gaudete*, which is the first Latin word of the Historic Introit assigned to this Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" (Gaudete in Domino semper = Rejoice in the Lord always).

THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Lord's Supper is celebrated at this congregation in the confession and glad confidence that, as He says, our Lord gives into our mouths not only bread and wine but His very body and blood to eat and to drink for the forgiveness of sins and to strengthen our union with Him and with one another. Our Lord invites to His Table those who trust His words, repent all sins, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us, that they may show forth His death until He comes.

Because those who eat and drink our Lord's body and blood unworthily, according to Holy Scripture, do so to their great harm and because Holy Communion is a confession of the faith which is confessed at this altar, any who are not yet instructed, in doubt, or who hold a confession differing from that of this congregation and the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, are asked to refrain from communing with us until such a time as they are properly instructed.

A short, more detailed explanation of our Confessional practice is available from our Ushers or Elders. If you would like to learn more about the Sacrament of the Altar and our confessional position, I would be happy to visit with you.

Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 40:1-8

Epistle Reading: 1 Corinthians 4:1-5

1 This is how one should regard us, as servants of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God. 2 Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy. 3 But with me it is a very small thing that I should be judged by you or by any human court. In fact, I do not even judge myself. 4 I am not aware of anything against myself, but I am not thereby acquitted. It is the Lord who judges me. 5 Therefore do not pronounce judgment before the time, before the Lord comes, who will bring to light the things now hidden in darkness and will

disclose the purposes of the heart. Then each one will receive his commendation from God.

Alleluia Verse (Psalm 80:2b)

Gospel Reading: Matthew 11:2-11

² When John heard in prison about the deeds of the Christ, he sent word by his disciples 3 and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or shall we look for another?" 4 And Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: 5 the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them. 6 And blessed is the one who is not offended by me."

⁷ As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds concerning John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? 8 What then did you go out to see? A man dressed in soft clothing? Behold, those who wear soft clothing are in kings' houses. 9 What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. 10 This is he of whom it is written

"Behold, I send my messenger before your face, who will prepare your way before you.'

11 Truly, I say to you, among those born of women there has arisen no one greater than John the Baptist. Yet the one who is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."

John the Baptizer Prepares the Way for the Lord As We Gather...

The voice of the Baptizer cried out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord . . . " (Isaiah 40:1). John called the people to be made ready for the Messiah's coming through repentance, for "all flesh is grass" (Isaiah 40:6). Now He asks from prison, "Are you the one who is to come . . .?" (Matthew 11:2). Jesus' works bear witness that He is. The sick are made well; the dead are raised, and the poor have the Gospel preached to them. Their iniquity is pardoned; they have received from the Lord's hand double forgiveness for all their sins. The "stewards of the mysteries of God" (1 Corinthians 4:1) still deliver Christ's overflowing forgiveness to the poor in spirit, comforting God's people with the word of the Gospel which stands forever. This Gospel produces rejoicing among all those who believe.

[God's Gift of Life]

You shall not murder.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and support him in despise every physical need.

52. What does God forbid in the Fifth Commandment?

- A. God forbidden us to take the life of another person (murder, abortion, euthanasia) or our own life (suicide).
 - 150 **Genesis 9:6** Whoever sheds the blood of man, by man shall his blood be shed; for in the image of God has God made man.
 - 151 Matthew 26:52 All who draw the sword will die by the sword.

Bible narratives: Cain murdered his brother Abel (Genesis 4:8). David murdered Uriah through others (2 Samuel 11:15). Killing through carelessness (Exodus 21:29 and Deuteronomy 22:8). Judas killed himself (Matthew 27:5).

ABORTION

The living but unborn are persons in the sight of God from the time of conception. Since abortion takes a human life, it is not a moral option except to prevent the death of another person, the mother.

- 152 **Jeremiah 1:5** Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart.
- 153 **Psalm 139:16** Your eyes saw my unformed body. All the days ordained for me were written in Your book before one of them came to be.

Bible narrative: John the Baptist leaped for joy while still in his mother's womb. In doing so, John the Baptist and Elizabeth, by the Holy Spirit, acknowledged the unborn Jesus as Lord (Luke 1:41-44).

EUTHANASIA

The severely handicapped, infirm, helpless, and aged are persons in the sight of God with life given by Him and to be ended only by Him.

- 154 **Proverbs 6:16-17** There are six things the Lord hates, seven that are detestable to Him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, hands that shed innocent blood.
- 155 **Proverbs 31:8** Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute.
- 156 Acts 17:25 He Himself gives all men life and breath and everything else.
